"Before I came to Shalom, my life was just a struggle. I never had my own place. I moved from couch to couch...And then when I had my son, I just knew I had to do something. When you are on your own, and homeless with a child, you don't really have a choice."

Fleeing an abusive relationship, Dominique took shelter at Wheeler Mission's Center for Women and Children. There, she learned about Shalom Community Center and our Rapid Re-Housing program. Rapid Re-Housing Coordinator Amy Harrison met with Dominique and worked steadily to help her and her son Nyles find a home of their own.

Dominique said, "When there was a setback, Amy always told me, 'Don't you worry about it, we're going to get you a place, don't worry.' She kept my head up. She was on her job!"

Dominique says that she would have kept trying to get into an apartment but admits that, without Shalom, it would have taken much, much longer and been much more challenging.

"Yeah, I'm grateful to have been a witness to all that, to be a part of it.

Housing is the Heart of It

Housing is the heart of homeless services. It is too easy for us to get stuck "managing" homelessness rather than ending it. That's why Shalom has so actively



Rev. Forrest Gilmore Executive Director pushed our programs to seek housing "first" and then surround our residents with the supports they need to thrive. In 2017, Shalom helped house 884 people, our highest in our history, thanks to the amazing support of countless people like you.

Rapid Re-Housing is one of our strongest program additions. Starting in 2014, the grant-funded program has steadily grown to be our single most successful housing program by the numbers. Last year, Rapid Re-Housing housed 201 people, including 88 children. Amazingly, thanks in large part to Rapid Re-Housing, Shalom houses more families experiencing homelessness

in Monroe County than any other homeless services provider. But, the best part of the program is how it partners with all the shelters and street outreach services in our community.

The program works by combining financial assistance for rent, utilities, application fees, moving costs, back debt, and more with the supportive services of our Rapid Re-Housing team, aiming for stability in as little as three months (and no longer than twelve). Two great employees take the lead on this program, providing housing search and placement, case management, life

A Letter from a Mother

My son Matt,* moved to Bloomington quite awhile ago to attend IU. He has been struggling with schizophrenia and has been homeless in Bloomington for a few years now. A couple months ago Matt called me and told me that he was no longer "malnourished and starving" because he found Shalom, where he can get "real food," not like at the food pantries. I guess he means he can get hot meals at Shalom Center. After his call, I went to the Shalom web site and checked out your mission and the work you are doing. I really like what you are trying to accomplish.

I wish that Matt would take advantage of all you have to offer, but I'm afraid that because of his paranoia and some delusions, that he will not. I even wonder if he would stop going to your center if he knew that you and I were in contact.

Ironically, Matt has a friend who is an attorney who provides some outside services to people at Shalom and that is probably how he got to Shalom. I should say that they were personal friends before Matt became so ill. Barbara has continued to try and help him over the years, but Matt doesn't trust her anymore. He doesn't trust a lot of people anymore. Matt doesn't believe that there is anything wrong with him.

When Matt was young, he was a sensitive person, intelligent, kind, and loving. It has been very hard on our family and his friends to see what this illness has done to him.

Thank you for the work you do there in Bloomington with the homeless. Thank you for checking up on Matt when I need to know.

skills training, budgeting support, and more. Amy Harrison serves as the Coordinator of the program with Jill Perkins as Caseworker. Together, they work very hard to make sure as many people as possible find their way back home.

Shockingly, federal funding cuts have led to a 38% drop in funding this year, a loss of more than \$92,000, risking layoffs and putting the incredible impact of this program at risk. Thanks to an emergency grant from an anonymous family foundation, we can at least prevent any layoffs and have some time to build our funding back up from other sources. Amy is typically the first face guests see, providing hope, guidance, and empowerment to families as they move out of homelessness and back into their own homes.


